## If the patient answers YES to any of the above, please refer to the following for next steps:

- <sup>1</sup> Advise patient to call 9-1-1 or go directly to their nearest emergency department right away. These symptoms require emergency medical care.
- <sup>2</sup> Advise patient to consult their family doctor or nurse practitioner. They can call 8-1-1 anytime to talk to a nurse at HealthLinkBC and get advice about how they are feeling and what to do next. Ask them to monitor how they are feeling. If it becomes harder to breathe, can't drink anything or feel much worse, they must seek urgent medical care at an urgent care clinic or emergency department.
- <sup>3</sup> Advise patient to get a COVID-19 test and self-isolate. Testing is recommended for anyone, including children of any age with cold, flu or COVID-19-like symptoms, even mild ones. COVID-19 positive individuals will be contacted by public health and given further instructions.
- <sup>4</sup> Patient must self-isolate and self-monitor for symptoms for 14 days upon their arrival. This is mandatory under the Quarantine Act. Returning travellers who develop symptoms are also required to self-isolate for at least 14 days or 10 days after onset of symptoms, whichever is longer.
- <sup>5</sup> Advise patient to self-isolate and self-monitor for symptoms for 14 days since their last contact with the positive person.
